THE TRAGIC CLUB HOUSE HOTEL

The Club House Hotel in Bourke, New South Wales, stood proudly on the northwest corner of Wilson and Hope streets from the late 19th century to the mid-20th century. Though a single-story brick building, it had an intriguing history that matched the town's reputation for fascinating tales.

Dating back to around 1885, the hotel quickly became a prominent fixture in the town. Bourke was a bustling hub during those times, and the Club House Hotel was a lively place where locals and travellers alike would gather to share stories and experiences. Shortly after Barton's death, the unfortunate trend continued. Samuel Webber, also known as "Sam Slick," a riverboat hand, was found dead in the hotel's outhouse. He had been drinking heavily before succumbing to what was believed to be a heart attack.

The repeated misfortunes and eerie occurrences became too much for the Club House Hotel. The once-vibrant establishment had gained a reputation for its string of tragedies, and the locals began to view it with apprehension. The hotel's business dwindled, and the owners decided to sell it.

In 1947, the Tancred brothers, proprietors of the town's abattoirs, purchased the property with plans to transform it into a boarding house. However, despite their intentions, the building's dark history seemed inescapable. A few years later, in 1948, the Club House Hotel was ultimately demolished, bringing an end to its storied existence.

The tales of the Club House Hotel continued to echo through the years, passing into local legend. Even now, long after its demolition, the memory of the hotel and its haunting stories remains a topic of fascination among Bourke's residents.
